We are also working on those problem-solving strategies. The students are trying to find what strategy helps them at being a better problem This is a solver. continuous process, so we will work on this skill throughout the The 5th Graders vear. also have "First in Math" accounts. This is an online website to improve their math skills. We monitor their progress on a chart in our classroom. We have a few students beyond 1,000 points. They can log in at home or anywhere where they have internet access.

6<sup>th</sup> grade also have "First in Math" accounts. They are racking up the stickers quickly. Each of their points sticker get charted in the math classroom on the wall. Thev are verv competitive, so there are lots of students working outside of class to earn stickers. All 6<sup>th</sup> graders need to have 1,000 points at end of semester. There are 9 students already beyond that goal. The 6<sup>th</sup> grade class is learning about ratios. diagramming fractional parts of a number. adding/subtracting fractions, just to name a They are eager few. learners and grasp new concepts quickly. ### Revenue Purpose Statement To Be Voted On In December

The **IKM-Manning** School Board will hold a public hearing at 7:00 on November 11 during the IKM-Manning Interim Board's regular meeting. During the public hearing questions regarding the Revenue Purpose Statement will be answered. The Revenue Purpose Statement will be voted on at a special election on December 7, 2010. This is not a vote for a new tax. This is a vote to approve the uses for funds generated by the statewide one cent sales tax. In the past two years both IKM and Manning approved Revenue Purpose Statements that cover the individual districts. Both districts had language that allowed for use of the funds for any cost allowed by law. With reorganization there is a need for a new RPS for the reorganized IKM-Manning District. The RPS must be approved before the new school district will be allowed to expend the funds for various district needs. The statewide one cent sales tax will begin when the existing School Infrastructure Local Option one cent sales tax expires in each county. The SILO tax was voted on by each county. The only vote that each school district now have is on the use of the funds that are already legislated. The RPS proposed by the IKM-Manning CSD is as follows:

#### Revenue Purpose Statement IKM-Manning

### Community School District

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 423F, Code of Iowa, the Board deems necessary and it desirable to adopt a new Revenue Purpose Statement to apply to revenues received from the Secure an Advanced Vision for Education Fund; and to adopt the Purpose Revenue Statement the to maximum period authorized by law;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board:

**Section 1.** That a special election is called of the qualified electors of the IKMManning

Community School District in the Counties of Audubon, Carroll, Crawford, and Shelby,

on Tuesday, December 7, 2010. The following Proposition is approved, and the Secretary is authorized and directed to submit and file the Proposition for the Ballot with the Audubon County Commissioner of Elections, Carroll County Commissioner of Elections, the Crawford County Commissioner of Elections. and the Shelby County Commissioner of Elections, no later than 5:00 p.m. on the fortysixth day before the election. "SHALL THE FOLLOWING PUBLIC MEASURE BE ADOPTED? YES [] NO[] Summary: To adopt the revenue purpose statement to authorize the expenditure of revenues from the State of Iowa secure an advanced vision for education fund received by the IKM-Manning Community School District. In the IKM-Manning Community School District, the following Revenue Purpose Statement which specifies the use of the sales, services and use tax funds from the State

of Iowa secure an advanced vision for education fund for school infrastructure (penny sales, services and use tax for schools) shall be adopted:

To provide funds for property tax relief.

To provide funds to build and furnish a new school building or buildings; to build and furnish addition(s) to school buildings in the District; to remodel. repair, expand. and improve the school buildings in the District; to purchase and improve grounds; for demolition work; to furnish and equip district facilities. To provide funds for the purchase, lease or leasepurchase of buildings or equipment (including transportation. technology and recreation equipment) as authorized by law, to implement energy conservation measures, sharing or rental of facilities, procuring or acquisition of libraries, or opening roads to school houses or buildings.

To provide funds for emergency repairs to respond to natural disasters, such as fire, wind damage, flood: unanticipated mechanical, plumbing, structural, roof, electrical system failures; environmental remediation; or to respond to changes in demographics that require construction of additions or improvements to school buildings or new school buildings.

To provide funds to establish and maintain public recreation places playgrounds; and provide for supervision instruction for and recreational activities; or community for education purposes; and other authorized expenditures and as now purposes or hereafter permitted by law and designated by **IKM-Manning** the School Community District.

To provide funds for the payment of principal and interest or retirement of general obligation bonds issued for school infrastructure purposes. energy improvement loans, loan agreements authorized by Iowa Code section 297.36, sales, service and use tax revenue bonds issued under Iowa Code section 423E.5.

It being understood that if this proposition should fail to be approved by the voters, such failure shall not be construed to terminate or restrict authority previously granted by the voters to expend receipts from the secure an advanced vision for education fund. approved, If this Revenue Purpose Statement shall remain in effect until replaced or amended by the IKM-Manning Community School District.

Section 2. In the event that the electorate does not approve this extension. the previously approved Revenue Purpose Statement shall remain effect until in its expiration on December 31, 2013.

Section 3. That all resolutions or orders or parts thereof in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

### <u>Accelerated</u> <u>Reading Brings</u> <u>Benefits</u>

We have just finished the first quarter of the 2010-2011 school year. It is hard to believe that the school year is already <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> done.

At the end of each quarter we have an AR (Accelerated Reader) reward for those student who attain their goal. computer AR is а that program tests reading comprehension. Students read books and then using a computer program, take an AR quiz on that book. for testing comprehension. The reward this quarter is an extra recess. Those not making their goal stay indoors and read during that time.

It is important to encourage children to read not only here at school, but also at home. Testing on books read at home helps them reach their AR goal here at school. Establishing good reading habits early is essential to success in school.

Here are some hints to help start a reading program at home.

Read to your children or have your children read to you. Kids love to listen to stories, but they also like to be the reader of the story. This can open up opportunities for some interesting and fun conversations with your family.

Allow time to read. Even make it a "treat" to stay up an extra 15 minutes to read or finish up a book. Kids love that special attention. Plus, they think they are getting away with something!

If they are stuck as to what to read, encourage them to find a book about something that interests them. For example, if they like sports, find books about sports. Maybe they like a certain author Then find other books written by that author. I know that I started reading a book by Judy Blume, and my class went crazy trying to check out anything she had written.

Most importantly, relax and make it fun! Reading is an easy way to create wonderful memories for both you and your children.

#### Annual Improvement Goal for 2009-2010:

During the 2009-2010 school year, the IKM Community School District will increase the percentage of 8th grade male students in the proficient or above levels in Reading Comprehension as measured by the ITBS compared to their previous year's total percent proficient on this assessment

**Goal Report:** The goal was met. During the 2008-2009 school year 60.0% of 7th grade males were proficient or above. During the 2009-2010 school year 65.2% of 8th grade males were proficient or above. This is an increase of 5.2% for the male cohort.

#### Annual Improvement Goal for 2010-2011:

During the 2010-2011 school year the IKM Community School District will increase the percentage of 8th grade students proficient or above in Reading Comprehension, as measured by ITBS, compared to their previous year's total percent proficient by 6%.

#### Reading

#### Annual Improvement Goal for 2009-2010:

During the 2009-2010 school year, the Manning Community School District will increase the percentage of students in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade who score in the proficient or above levels in Reading Comprehension by 17% (from 73% to 90%) as measured by the ITBS.

**Goal Report:** The goal was not met. During the 2008-2009 school year, 73% of 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students were proficient or above. During the 2009-2010 school year, 85.3% of 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students were proficient or above Although this is an increase it did not meet our goal of a 17% increase.

#### Annual Improvement Goal for 2010-2011:

During the 2010-2011 school year the Manning Community School District will increase the percentage of 11<sup>th</sup> grade students proficient or above in Reading Comprehension, as measured by ITED, compared to their previous year's total percent proficient by 10%.

**Current Status:** 74.6% of 10<sup>th</sup> grade students are proficient or above.

#### Action Plan to Meet the Goal:

- •Identify specific reading skills to target.
- •Monitor subgroup progress throughout the year.

•Implement CRISS strategies and differentiated instruction for reading in all content areas.

•Use effective feedback strategies when providing feedback to students.

### From The Desk of Mr. Wall

As we get deeper in to the school year absences begin to accumulate for some students. Absences, excused or otherwise, always cause disruption some in the educational process of the student who was absent. Irregular attendance or tardiness not only limits the student's own learning, but also interferes with the progress of those pupils who are regular and prompt in attendance. their The complete attendance policy can be found on page 17 in your student's copy of the Student Handbook in the front of their student planner which is also available on my web page on our school website<sup>.</sup> www ikmmanning.k12.ia.us. The policy relates individual class attendance and credit for that class. The basic premise of the policy is that a student will be put on "No Credit Status" if they have 6 or more unexcused absences from any given class in a semester. As with any policy there is an appeal process and special circumstances are taken under consideration. As a

parent/guardian, your cooperation is needed the form in of encouraging good attendance and communicating with the school any time vour child is absent from school. If you know in advance that an absence will be necessary, give timely notice to the school office. If the absence was unanticipated, the parent/guardian should call the school on the day of the absence by 9:00 a.m. If that is not possible, the parent/guardian should send written notice to school the the student dav returns. The school make the will determination of whether an absence is excused or unexcused. Consequently it is necessary for you as parent/guardian to provide specific reasons for absences, ie doctor appointment, family trip, etc. If there is no communication from home on the day of the absence or the day the student returns or specific reasons are not provided, the absence may be considered unexcused or truancy. Please try to keep all absences to a minimum and if you are unsure whether or not an absence would

be considered excused or unexcused vou should contact the school. There are limits on the number of absences in some categories that can be excused. For personal example; illness verified only by parent/guardian (10 per year), work at home (5 per year, prior notice required), family event with parent/guardian (5 per year), college visitation (2 per year, Juniors & Seniors only). Your cooperation in communicating with the school regarding student absence is greatly appreciated. Attendance information for your student is available through our Parent Online access on our school webpage or you can contact the high school office.
