

MARYVILLE, Mo. - Northwest Missouri State head coach Gene Steinmeyer has announced the early signing of Tember Schechinger to a national letter of intent for the 2012-13 season.

"Tember is a guard who can wear a lot of hats," said Steinmeyer. "She is an excellent shooter and her aggressiveness on both ends of the court is what caught my eye."

Schechinger signs with the Bearcats after being recruited by all levels including interest from several Division I schools. She helped led IKM-Manning High, (Manilla, Iowa) to a 19-5 record last year as a junior averaging 13.5 points per game and shooting 52 percent from the field earning First Team All-State honors the Iowa Girls Coaches from Association. She was named All-District and First Team All-Western Valley Conference for the Iowa state tournament qualifier.

She also recorded 94 assists and 87 steals during her junior campaign and added 33 blocks from her guard position. Schechinger played AAU for the Iowa Attack and earned 2011 "Best Basketball Players of AAU" recognition over the previous two summers. Congrats Tember!

I came across the following parable in a newsletter I subscribe to. I don't know who the original author is but as a teacher and as a parent, I love the message:

There's a parable about a new mother who discovered a butterfly struggling mightily to escape its cocoon through a tiny opening at the top. She became concerned when the creature seemed to give up after making no progress. Certain that the butterfly just wouldn't make it out without help, she enlarged the hole slightly. On its next try, the butterfly wriggled out easily. But the young mother's joy turned to horror as she saw its wings were shriveled and useless. Her well-intentioned intervention turned out badly because it interrupted a natural process. You see, forcing the butterfly to squeeze though a small opening is nature's way of assuring that blood from the creature's body is pushed into the wings. By making it easier, she deprived the butterfly of strong wings.

Childhood, too, is a sort of cocoon. If a healthy adult is to emerge, parents must allow, even encourage, their children to struggle, to make mistakes and learn from them, and to pay a price for their own bad judgments and conduct. Of course, good parents should be ready to protect their children from serious harm. But being overprotective can itself cause serious harm. Adversity is not always an enemy. It's often a teacher that helps young people develop wings strengthened by self-confidence and self-reliance.

Helen Keller once said, "Character cannot be developed in ease and quiet. Only through experience of trial and suffering can the soul be strengthened, vision cleared, ambition inspired, and success achieved."

I hope you all have a wonderful holiday season and I look forward to seeing you at school events this winter.

At this point in the school year, all parents have had the opportunity to meet with the teachers at parent-teacher conference. This is an excellent time to monitor the progress and address concerns and to set goals for the remainder of the school year.

The next three and a half weeks-between Thanksgiving and the Winter Break-is usually a hectic time with programs, concerts and parties, so it's important that students have adequate time for properly completed homework and study time. In the elementary and middle schools years, homework amounts to 30 to 60 minutes each evening and good homework habits can take years to build and last a lifetime.

I hope you have had the opportunity to read some of my articles in our local papers, if not, we will be adding those to our website. We will also be adding a link so parents, patrons, and students can read the "blueprint" for changes in the education of Iowan students. This "blueprint" is the culmination of a number of ideas from the Education Summit this past summer.

This blueprint shows specific steps we can take to move our schools from good to excellent-not with isolated approaches, but by having our whole system work better together. The blueprint is not a list of options but is a set of changes designed to work together to create an "all-systems" approach. Lasting and meaningful change requires this sort of commitment and transformation. The whole system must change to improve and the efforts must be focused and sustained.

Gathering input and feedback, from the most important stakeholders is of the upmost importance to me. Who is the greatest stakeholder you ask? The student-who else could it be? That is why this year I have added two student representatives to the board meetings. Elizabeth Halbur and Patrick Bruck are the 2011-2012 Students Reps to the Board. They will act as liaisons between students and the board. I firmly believe as educators and adults we can learn a great deal from our students by listening to what they have to say about their experiences in school, their interest, desires, and how students feel they learn best. Moreover, I believe gathering information from our students can play a significant role in our school improvement efforts.

The IKM School District began whole-grade sharing with the Manning School District during the 2008-2009 school year. Since that time, the IKM district no longer serves students in grades 9-12. Therefore, graduation data as well as postsecondary plans are no longer a part of the data collection in the IKM School District.

Early Childhood Local Indicators of Achievement

In addition to Average Daily Attendance and Dropout Data, the IKM Community School District uses DIBELS early literacy data as a local indicator of student achievement. The district believes a comprehensive, research-based reading program that includes literacy skills instruction, practice, and assessment can help more students become proficient readers. In Kindergarten and 1st grade, DIBELS assesses student progress with early literacy skills.

State and Local Indicators of Achievement

Effective schools research indicates that high attendance is an indicator of potential student achievement. School attendance is an indicator of school and later career success.

Manning Community School District had a 1.17% dropout rate (Grades 9-12) during the 2009-10 school year. Dropout Rate is calculated by the Iowa State Department of Education. The most current data is from the 2009-10 school year. Data from 2010-11 was calculated according to district records. State data may vary slightly.

Graduation Rate is calculated yearly by the Iowa State Department of Education. The most current data is for the graduating class of 2010. Data from 2010-11 was calculated according to district records. State data may vary slightly.

Core Program is the recommended core college preparatory curriculum. This curriculum includes 4+ years of English, 3+ years of Mathematics, 3+ years of Social Studies, and 3+ years of Science.

Students who intend to go to college generally take the American College Testing Program (ACT) Exam to meet entrance requirements. A score of twenty or higher on the 36-point scale indicates probable success in college.

Concurrent Enrollment course data is based on the number of seniors who participate in at least one dual credit course. The student who successfully completes a Concurrent Enrollment course receives DMACC credit as well as IKM-Manning High School credit toward graduation requirements.
